What is the timeline of the application process?

Thursday 21 th March 2024	Applications open
Friday 12 th April 2024 – 5pm	Application closing date
Monday 27 th April 2024	Funding confirmation sent out by SNB

Eligibility criteria

To receive a Safer Neighbourhood Board (SNB) Community Engagement grant you must be a registered charity, community interest company, a not for profit organisation or a voluntary group based in Enfield.

All successful applicants must have a company or community bank account and the following policies:

- A health and safety policy and/or risk assessment,
- An equal opportunities policy
- A child protection or safeguarding policy if you work with children or vulnerable adults

You may be asked to provide proof of this after you have submitted your application.

Priority will be given to organisations meeting the criteria and who have not been in receipt of the SNB grant in the last three years.

Successful projects will be focused on a least in one of the following areas:

- Reducing and preventing violence
- Increasing trust and confidence
- Better supporting victims
- Protecting people from being exploited or harmed

Where does the funding come from?

The grant comes from the Mayor' Office for Policing And Crime (MOPAC) to support and deliver specific crime reduction and crime related problems identified by the local community.

How do I know if my project is suitable for promotional activities?

We envision that most projects will be suitable, however some projects will not. This is because some projects do not have a physical aspect and others may not be appropriate due to the nature of their work.

Will I need to complete a grant agreement?

All successful applicants will need to complete a grant agreement prior to the funds being released.

What should I include if I do not know when all the activities will run?

if you are unsure of when all the activities will run, please enter TBC and when we can follow up.

What should I include when I describe the anticipated outcomes of the project?

Tell us about the anticipated impact of the activities taking place. These should be measurable and if you struggle to quantify, it may be worth considering how you make it simpler.

Are there any examples of how the project outcomes could be measured?

Examples of measures that could be used include:

- Attendance numbers or numbers spoken to at a stall
- Completion of a course of activity
- Surveys
- Case studies

What categorises could I use to describe my project?

Examples of categorises that could be used to describe your project include youth engagement, anti-social behaviour, burglary, etc.

Should I list the project partner's credentials or a biography?

We are looking for you to name the different organisations and stakeholders who will be involved in the project; we are interested in the partnership work element.

How much funding is available?

Applicants can request from £500 to £5000.

How should I present the major cost elements of the project?

Provide an outline of the major cost elements - be clear about the amounts involved and the quantities. If your project is part funded, please be clear about the amount of funding you need from the Safer Neighbourhood Board (SNB).
